Child Awarded Settlement in Lead Disease Lawsuit

In virtually all homes built before 1978, lead paint was used on interior and exterior surfaces. When lead paint deteriorates, paint chips become a source of dangerous exposure to young children. Lead is a toxic metal which affects the brain system of a child causing learning and speech difficulties, as well as severe behavioral problems.

Our client's child, age two, of Buffalo, New York, was exposed to high levels of lead dust in his bedroom due to negligent work done by outside contractors removing lead paint. Four years later, our client's child has speech and learning difficulties requiring special education.

In this case, the child had an extremely high level of lead in his blood when his blood was drawn and tested during a routine pediatric examination. He will receive a substantial cash settlement as a result of an agreement reached in early

September. It is believed to be the largest money award of its kind to date in Western New York.

At the request of the party paying the award, the amount of the settlement remains confidential.

Changing Times in Asbestos Litigation

The manufacture, sale and use of asbestos products have inflicted injury and death across our country and around the world. There are now tens of thousands of lawsuits pending in state and federal courts against a relatively small number of former manufacturers and producers of asbestos products. Not

unexpectedly, insurance monies set aside to pay victims of asbestos disease have been exhausted or are insufficient to pay pending claims, and more claims are anticipated.

Consequently, there has been a large increase in asbestos company bankruptcy filings, particularly in the past year. In light of this crisis affecting the rights of asbestos victims, the attorneys at Lipsitz & Ponterio have been for some time turning their attention toward the responsibility of those companies - often locally owned or operated - which engaged in selling and installing asbestos products. To the extent that local contractors knew of the dangers of asbestos yet failed to disclose those dangers to the public, they must be held responsible for the damages suffered by their victims, just as if they had manufactured the products in the first place.

Although bankruptcies have jeopardized the size of the money settlement you may receive in your asbestos lawsuit, the attorneys at Lipsitz & Ponterio are working aggressively to hold distributors, contractors and site owners accountable to the fullest extent under the law so that you and your family will receive just compensation for your injuries.

Local Asbestos Contractor Responsible for Niagara County Worker's Death

Recently, attorneys at Lipsitz & Ponterio uncovered internal correspondence from 1960 revealing that a prominent local seller and installer of asbestos knew that asbestos dust caused

death in exposed workers yet failed to warn its own employees and customers.

Last week, this local contractor agreed to pay a half million dollars to the family of a former Niagara County factory worker who died from mesothelioma..

Previously, the largest settlement this contractor ever paid to any injured worker was \$65,000.

Medical Malpractice Young Woman Receives Award for Radiation Exposure

Our office represented a young woman in a medical malpractice case against a physician who administered radiation treatments following surgery for cancer. According to our client's ob/gyn, she became sterile after receiving the radiation treatments to her pelvic area.

A physician must take reasonable steps to protect his patients from harm. In this case, the physician did not shield our client's ovaries from radiation exposure.

After a week-long trial, our client received a substantial cash settlement.

Update on Construction Worker Cases

This summer the attorneys at Lipsitz & Ponterio won a court victory in Niagara County for a construction worker who fell from an elevated height and injured his knee, requiring a knee replacement.

Although the owner of the construction site has filed an appeal, our attorneys expect to

gain a victory in the higher court, as well.

If you fall from a height due to the absence of a required safety device or the failure of a safety device, you are protected under New York State Labor Law Section 240.

Unfortunately, the insurance industry and construction companies have combined together to weaken or eliminate your legal protections under Labor Law Section 240. This law puts responsibility for height-related injuries where it belongs - on the owners of construction sites, not on the victims of accidents. The insurance industry is lobbying intensely to shift the responsibility onto the backs of workers. Urge your state representatives not to cave into pressure from the insurance lobby.

If you, a family member or friend has fallen from a height while working on a construction site, please call Lipsitz & Ponterio to discuss your legal remedies.

Upcoming Trials

We have a busy Fall trial schedule in our office. A few of these personal injury trials are highlighted for your review.

1. October 15, 2001 - We start a jury trial in Buffalo on behalf of a child injured from lead poisoning against a slum landlord who knew lead was dangerous and failed to alert the family he rented to.

2. October 16, 2001 - We represent a passenger in a van who suffered multiple fractures to both her legs when the van was hit by an NFT Metro bus. This auto accident trial will take place in Federal Court in Buffalo.

3. November 13, 2001 - We start a jury trial in Buffalo on behalf of a

family whose husband died of mesothelioma, an asbestos cancer. This wrongful death action is against manufacturers, distributors and installers of asbestos.

4. December 10, 2001 - We represent a construction worker who suffered disabling injuries in a fall at the work site. This jury trial will take place in State Supreme Court in Buffalo.

Claims for Occupational Disease and Death

If your spouse or parent dies of a disease caused by toxic exposure at work, including lung disease and cancer, you are entitled to file a claim for death benefits under the New York State Workers' Compensation Law, provided that your claim is filed within two years of the date of death.

The firm of Lipsitz & Ponterio handles many occupational death claims and gives each case prompt and thorough attention. Where necessary, we obtain a medical expert to review the facts of the case and provide an opinion concerning the connection between industrial exposure and death. Although an individual may die of multiple causes, if occupational disease cuts short the life of a family member even one day sooner than he otherwise would have died, the surviving spouse may be entitled to lifetime benefits under the law.

In recent months, employers and the insurance companies that provide workers' compensation insurance coverage have become increasingly hostile to claims of death caused by industrial disease. The insurance industry is reluctant to recognize and deal with its responsibility to pay claims under the Workers' Compensation Law. Consequently, we have been fighting harder, and in some cases longer, in order to establish death cases under the Workers' Compensation Law.

In one recent case, involving exposure to carcinogens at the Hooker Chemical Plant on Buffalo Avenue in Niagara Falls, the treating doctor expressed his opinion that our client's exposure placed him at an increased risk for the development of bladder cancer from which he ultimately died. Based on this opinion, the workers' compensation judge found that

there was sufficient evidence to proceed with further development of the case, precisely because the doctor's opinion constituted some evidence of an occupational disease causally related to exposures experienced during the course of employment and because there was a probability that those exposures constituted the cause of the disease. The employer and its workers' compensation insurance carrier appealed this decision, and our attorneys were able to persuade the Board that the workers' compensation judge was correct in his initial decision.

Several months later, in another case, this time involving a claim that occupational exposure to asbestos over the course of a career as an ironworker was the cause of lung cancer, the workers' compensation judge ruled against the family's claim of occupationally related death. Our attorneys appealed from this decision and successfully persuaded the Board that the judge was wrong and that indeed the opinion of our medical expert, a specialist in pulmonary disease, was sufficient to move the case forward.

The Workers' Compensation Board ruled that the medical expert's opinion must set forth an accurate history of a work related occupational disease, a diagnosis, and a statement that there is a causal relationship between the work place exposure and the diagnosis. Applying that ruling to the facts before it, the Board found that our expert's opinion did indeed satisfy this standard.

The Board's decision made it clear that, as long as a doctor who treats or examines an injured worker will state that the exposure to a toxic substance at work was the cause of a particular disease, the case can go forward.

As you can see from this decision, it is very important to enlist the cooperation of the treating doctor in

proving a case of occupational disease and death.
